## Why tackle **online violence** against women and girls?

- A large part of **social lives** of young people **takes place online**.
- But this has **risks**: wide audience, spreading of content and **susceptible to unwanted messaging**.
- **Violence against women and girls** has **escalated** in the digital sphere. Research shows that **women and girls** are specifically targeted by online violence; often of a **sexual nature**.
- The EU estimates that **1 in 10 women** have already experienced a form of online violence from the age of 15 onwards (EIGE 2017)

## WAVE 2020 Conference “Structural inequality: the root of the global pandemic of violence against women” and CYBERSAFE workshop

On October 8th, at the online WAVE 2020 conference “Structural inequality: the root of the global pandemic of violence against women”, several Cybersafe partners had the opportunity to present the project to a wide international audience in a workshop on different models of effectively tackling digital violence and abuse. The workshop was chaired by Pille Tsopp-Pagan of the Women’s Support and Information Centre, Estonia.

International Child Development Initiatives’ (ICDI’s) Rutger van Oudenhoven & Mathijs Euwema and Martin Bärmann of Serious Games Interactive explained the ins and outs of the Toolkit and the Online Tool that were developed within the Cybersafe project. The audience was enthusiastic to learn about a simple,

Barbara Brečko of the University of Ljubljana–presented the project “Klick off! Let's stop cyberviolence against women and girls”, which was a national awareness raising project (2017-2019) on which Cybersafe was further developed. During Klick off!, project manuals for school professionals, justice and police were developed as well as a curriculum for conducting workshops with youth.

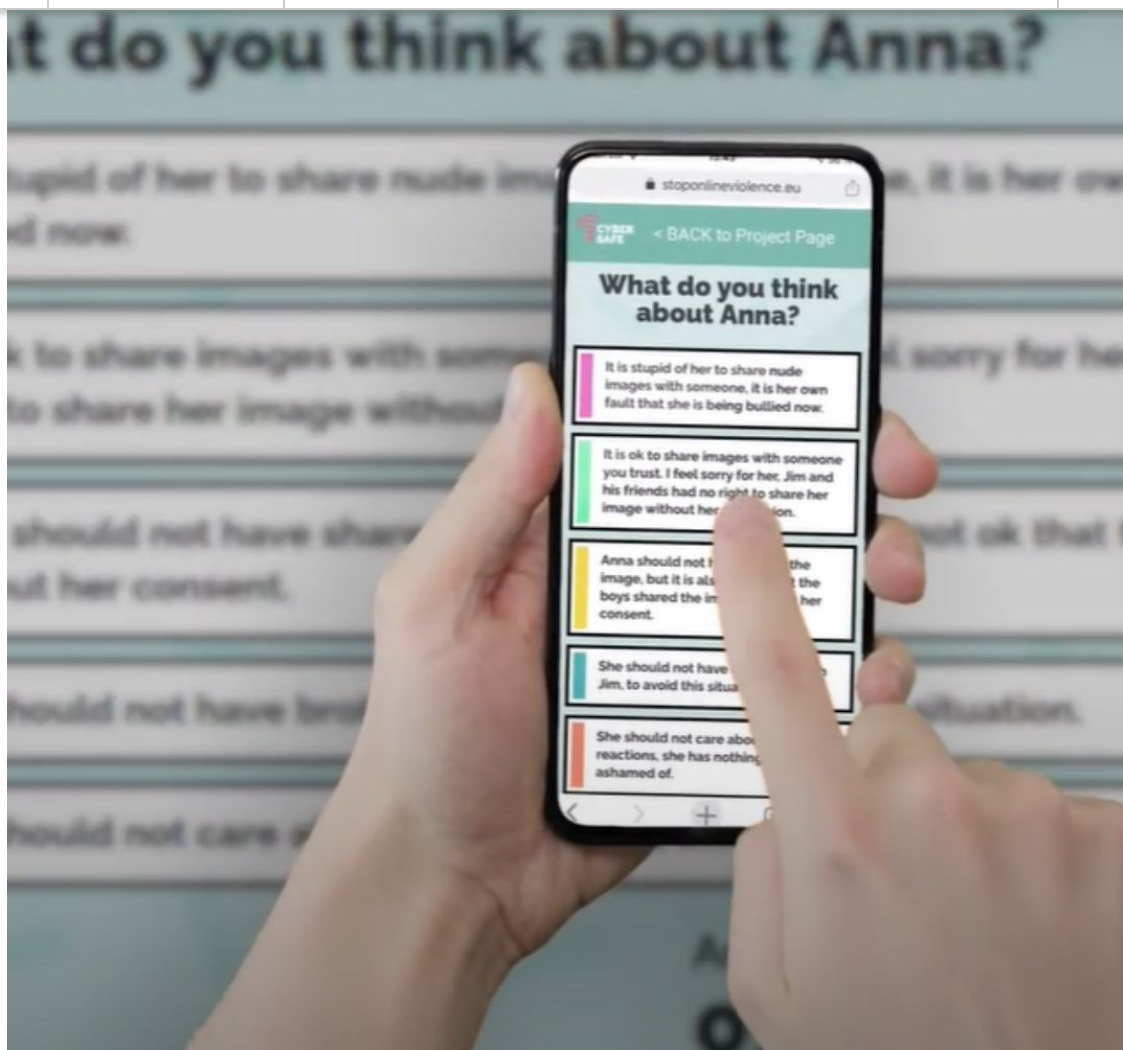

## CYBERSAFE Toolkit and video teaser

We are happy to announce that the video teaser for the CYBERSAFE Toolkit has been released! It is now available with the subtitles in 7 languages - Dutch, Estonian, Greek, Italian, Danish, Slovenian, and German.

The CYBERSAFE Toolkit is intended for teachers or other professionals working with young people, who want to address online violence against women and girls. The toolkit helps to recognise signs of online violence, possible consequences and to understand how to prevent online violence.

The toolkit provides four workshops dealing with the topics of non-consensual sharing of sexual images, exploitation, coercion and threats, sexualised bullying, and unwanted sexualisation, an online tool that encourages discussion and role play and a guide with practical information.

### **Article by Barbara Brečko and Nicholas Spetsidis about cyber violence and CYBERSAFE**

Our Partners Barbara Brečko (University of Ljubljana) and Nicholas Spetsidis (UWAH) wrote an article for the Vienna Institute for International Dialogue and Cooperation about how the effects of COVID-19 on cyber violence against girls and women are still under-reported and under investigation.

During the lockdown and social distancing, the use of the internet has rapidly increased, and as a side-effect women and girls have been at a higher risk of online forms of violence. The article presents the challenges of the current situation and the rapid increase in online violence. The provision of digital tools such as the CYBERSAFE Toolkit can help to raise awareness and reducing the gender digital divide and therefore also cyber violence.

## **First CYBERSAFE pilot workshops held in Italy, Estonia, and Greece**

Despite serious constrictions due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, several CYBERSAFE partners were able to conduct workshops with youth to test the Toolkit and the online tool that was developed within this project.

These workshops already show that young people have a great interest in the topic of online sexual violence against girls. In the workshop, they worked with the online tool; using their mobile phones, the students were invited to give their opinion on online sexual violence and act out several roleplays. In this way, they learned to recognize online sexual violence, how to discuss it and open up about it.

The most successful and productive workshops were those held in person and when/if participants already knew each other. During the online sessions, held because of COVID-19 regulations, the interaction between participants and discussion about this difficult subject proved to be more difficult. All in all, the young participants appreciated the opportunity to discuss this important issue that often affects their lives.

The project partners agree to have learned a lot from this pilot process and are now ready to implement the project in schools throughout Europe.

## **The project partners' meeting**

The project partners met online on November 6<sup>th</sup> for the fourth Steering Committee Meeting. The discussion focused on the overall status of the project and on the progress and next steps in three main areas. The first was the testing and finalisation of the Cybersafe Toolkit: the pre-testing in schools started, but the deadline needed to be extended due to the lockdown in some

was discussed by the partners, including the planning of the next activities and evaluation of their results. To conclude, the project's dissemination activities were also presented, including the first ideas for the final conference that will take place in May 2021.

The CYBERSAFE project will create several outputs over the 2-year project period. Below is a short description of the outputs which you can look forward to downloading in the future from the official project website!

All project outputs are free of charge and will be downloadable in the 8 project languages: Danish, Dutch, English, Estonian, German, Greek, Italian, and Slovenian.

- **Report on cyber violence against women and girls** which will describe the existing landscape and key findings on the needs & attitudes of



**cyber violence against women and girls** which will entail:

- a **Serious Online Game** promoting behavioural change among teenagers on the topic of cyber violence against women and girls
- **Educational Intervention guidelines** that provide relevant information & activity tools aiming at the prevention of cyber violence against women and girls among teenagers
- **1-day Pilot Interventions** will be held in learning settings which will promote a participatory approach where students, through experiential learning activities, will participate in role-playing, sociodrama, simulations, and development of animations. After the evaluation of the interventions, **replication guidelines** will be published in English.
